Fall – to lose the old, to have its proper place. This is just part of the many definitions of what the dictionary says "fall" is. What is crazy is that the dictionary is talking about fall like 'I fell down', not fall like 'the season' and yet how appropriate the definition is. I love fall!! The color change, the weather change, the smell change.....its about change. But to change means that something must go. You see, for every beginning there is an end and for every ending there is a new beginning. What I find amazing is that trees still stand. Those branches still reach out and upward. There is beauty in the strength of those branches.

This is such a picture of what Jesus does in our lives. We go through all kinds of seasons. 

Wise Purposes

The United Kingdom brims with history. Everywhere you go, you see plaques honoring historic figures or commemorating sites where important events occurred. But one such sign exemplifies the droll British sense of humor. On a weathered plaque outside a bed and breakfast in Sandwich England, a message reads, "On this site, Sept. 5, 1782, nothing happened."

Sometimes it seems to us that nothing is happening regarding our prayers. We pray and pray, bringing our petitions to our Father with expectation that He'll respond-right now. The psalmist David expressed such frustration when he prayed, "How long, LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?" (Psalm 13:1). We can easily echo those same thoughts: How long, Lord, before you respond?

However, our God is not only perfect in His wisdom but also in His timing. David was able to say, "I trust in your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in your salvation" (v.5). Ecclesiastes 3:11 reminds us "(God) has made everything beautiful in its time." The word beautiful means "appropriate" or "a source of delight." God may not always respond to our prayers when we'd like Him to, but he's always working out His wise purposes. We can take heart that when He does answer, it will be right and good and beautiful.

When have you prayed for something and felt that perhaps God was ignoring your request?

What lesson might you have leaned in that time of waiting?

Loving God, please help me to learn a patience in prayer borne of trust in You.



Mission

The mission of the Caring & Sharing Food Pantry is to engage the local giving community and volunteers to help us serve our neighbors and work against food insecurity in Paulding County.

Services

We provide food to qualifying Paulding County residents, and we are open at 318 N. Walnut Street, Paulding, on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to noon.

Who qualifies? People must live in Paulding County to receive food from us. They must have household earnings that are at or less than 200% of the federal poverty level (based on the number of people living in the household).

How often? Qualifying residents can visit the pantry up to twice per month and receive food based on the number of people in their household.

What is provided? Clients can "shop" our shelves which typically contain shelf-stable canned and boxed foods, including vegetables, fruit, soup, tomato sauces, pasta/noodles, breakfast food, peanut butter, and more. We also provide frozen and canned meat, possibly eggs, other dairy products and produce. Additionally, we can usually offer personal care and home cleaning products.

Why the Pantry Exists

Food insecurity is a serious problem in our county. According to Feeding America, 12% of Paulding County residents are food insecure, meaning they do not have access to enough food to live healthy and active lives. Evidenced by the number of people directly served by the pantry, our county's need is great and growing.

In 2023, we served nearly 2,500 households and 6,323 people, and these numbers were 250% higher than in 2021. Through July 2024, we are trending a 33% increase of people served and a 25% increase in households served over 2023.

There are other food pantries in Paulding County — Grover Hill Food Pantry, Auglaize Chapel Church of God, Cecil Community Church and Christian Food Pantry of Antwerp. Periodically, we collaborate with these other pantries to share resources.

What It Takes to Operate the Pantry

A volunteer board and two part-time staff run the pantry with the support of about 90 volunteers each month. Most financial resources are donated by individuals and organizations.

Our stock (food, personal care and home cleaning products) is acquired through individual donations, food drives, West Ohio Food Drive, Feeding American donations from the Van Wert Walmart. We also purchase food as needed to serve our clients. In 2023, we receive more than 46 tons of donated stock.

Our History

The Caring & Sharing Food Pantry is now located at 318 N. Walnut Street in Paulding. The building was planned by a committee of local church leaders and funded by donations from members of the Paulding County community. The groundbreaking was Oct. 24, 2023, and the new pantry opened in April 2024.

The pantry began in 1980 in the basement of the rectory of what was St. Joseph Catholic Church, now Divine Mercy Catholic Parish. In 2003, it was reorganized with the help of United Way, Paulding Ministerial Association and Kiwanis. Before the new building on Walnut Street existed, the pantry was in the basement of what is now the Branch Christian Fellowship and the former doctor's office on Main Street.

The Caring & Sharing Food Pantry is a not-for-profit organization as defined under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. It operates primarily on food and financial donations from our community and with the support of Feeding American and West Ohio Food Bank, of which we are a member. We seek grants from businesses and charities both inside and outside the county and we participate in chartable programs sponsored by Kroger, Walmart and Meijer.

Donations

Food donations can be delivered to the pantry during its open hours of Wednesday and Saturday, 9 a.m. to noon. Enter in the door on the north side of the building labeled "donations." Alternative drop-off arrangements can be made by contacting the pantry. Please do not leave food items outside the pantry at any time.

Financial donations can be sent directly to the pantry at PO Box 391, Paulding, OH 45879.


