

Entitled **Speaking to Encourage**

Abraham Lincoln tops the polls as the most popular US president of all time. His troubled presidency came at the culmination of a life long struggle with depression, a nervous breakdown, and neighbors who were know to set suicide watches over him in his youth.

So how did he do it? The night he was assassinated, Lincoln's pockets ere stuffed with newspaper clippings that praised him, his leadership, and the positive impact he was having.

We all need encouragement. The author of Hebrews says in 10: 24-25, "Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another— and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

Ephesians 4:29 says, "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen." Imagine what could happen if we were able to live up to that in our homes, churches, and communities?

Don't go it alone. Hebrews 10:25 warns us not to give up meeting together. Jesus didn't go it alone. He gathered a group of people to share life and ministry with, and he asked His closest friends to watch and pray with Him when He needed it most. If Jesus sought out that kind of support, we should as well!

Let's be intentional about encouraging one another as we walk this journey together, so one has to go it alone.

BAPTISM AND CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

In Christianity, baptism is a significant ritual that symbolizes a person's public declaration of faith in Jesus Christ, signifying their commitment to follow him, their identification with Christ's death and resurrection, and the beginning of a new life cleansed from sin, essentially marking their entrance into the Christian community as a member of the church; it is often understood as a symbolic washing away of past sins and a rebirth into a life dedicated to God. If you have a desire to become a member of First Christian Church, baptism and a membership class is an integral part of that process. If you haven't been baptized, we can baptize you and accept you into our membership. If you're currently a member in another church, and have been baptized, we can accept you into membership by transfer of your membership to this congregation. If you are interested in becoming a member at First Christian Church, just communicate that to Pastor Ric or the church office, and we can set up a membership class and baptism.

Love makes us worthy

Unlike God, who loves unconditionally, humans often make choices and set limits when doling out affection. But Thomas Merton reminds us, "Our job is to love others without stopping to inquire whether or not they are worthy. That is not our business and, in fact, it is nobody's business. What we are asked to do is to love, and this love itself will render both ourselves and our neighbors worthy."

As for how to develop and maintain that type of love? Merton shares, "It is in deep solitude that I find the gentleness with which I can truly love my [neighbors]."

Leave it to God

Fourth-century theologian Augustine urged again and again that we focus on practicing love in the here and now, not on worrying about our lives in the hereafter.

In *Beautiful Bodies*, Margaret Miles writes that especially regarding complicated doctrines like predestination and challenges like "The one who endures to the end will be saved" (Matthew 24:13), we can't do anything *but* leave those to God. It's impossible for humans to take responsibility for ourselves in such matters. If we could determine our afterlife destiny by means of effort, persuasion or bribery, self-pride would surely be the accompanying sinful result.

"In fact," Miles writes, "preoccupation with one's eternal destiny distracts from a Christian's present business. 'Leave it to God,' St. Augustine said, and place your attention on living lovingly in the body of Christ here and now."

What you do:

HEARD AND SEEN:
HOPE IN A NEW HOMETOWN

Since the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, Week of Compassion has continued to accompany individuals and families affected by the war. Three years into this conflict with no clear end in sight, accompanying Ukrainian refugees is less focused on temporary arrangements while waiting to return home, and has redirected to helping them more fully integrate into neighboring regions, in addition to supporting the communities that are actively welcoming them.

Children and the elderly are especially vulnerable when adjusting to new environments. To enable integration into the wider community, programs are established as survivor- and community-led responses (SCLR). Week of Compassion's partner, Hungarian Reformed Church Aid, has distributed micro-grants to refugee communities and in their host communities in both Hungary

and Ukraine. This SCLR program's goal is to embrace community-led initiatives that foster lasting integration, empowerment, social cohesion, and resilience building. What does this look like in real, everyday life?

In Budapest, the Ukrainian Space offers after-school programs for primary and secondary students, from arts and crafts to Hungarian language courses, from mathematics to cookie-decorating! As their young lives have been disrupted by war, these programs provide an important place for children to simply be together, for them to paint and play and talk about their home, their family, life in the place they left and in the place they live now.
